> Commander Earl (39) was born in New Castle, Pennsylvania, but his family later moved to Arlington, Virginia, where he graduated from Washington-Lee High School. He later attended the United States Naval Academy, from which he graduated in 1951. While at the academy he was awar-ded letters in football and lacrosse, and also a trophy for his contribution to the promotion of athletics.

His first assignment was to the battleship U.S.S. Missouri in 1951, and since that time he has served on the aircraft carrier Midway, the submarine Pompon, had a tour of duty at the Naval Academy and later joined the landing ship dock San Marcos, from which he took part in amphibious landings at Lebanon.

Before assuming com-mand of the Calcaterra in assuming com-April, 1963, he was opera-tions officer and later exe-cutive officer of the destroyer Glennon, and was for a time on the staff of the Bureau of Naval Personnel in Washington.
